- Necrotic tissue – when to remove, when to leave alone
 - Slough
 - Eschar
 - Dry gangrene – Necrosis – Tissue demise
- Phases of wound healing

Wound Margin Issues and Strategies

- Healing edges/epithelizing
- Chronic wound edges
- Rolled edges – epiboly
- Hyperkeratotic
- Peri-Wound Issues
 - Maceration
 - Desiccation
 - Erythema
 - Induration
 - Fluctuance

Characteristics of Common Wounds

- Etiology, appearance, location, exudates
- Arterial insufficiency
- Venous insufficiency
- Diabetic/neuropathic
- Pressure ulcers – demystifying staging
- Skin tears


- Characteristics of each dressing category
- Exudate determines the dressing and frequency of change!
 - Hydrogel, hydrocolloid, collagen
 - Calcium alginate, hydrofibers
 - Foams, gauze/composite dressings

Strategies to Select Primary Dressings:

- Wound cleansing
- Dry/minimally draining wounds
 - Hydrogel
 - Oil emulsions
 - Hydrocolloids, non-adherent foams
 - Less frequent dressing changes
- Moderate/Heavy/Copious exudate
 - Alginates/hydrofibers
 - Co-polymers
 - More frequent dressing changes
- Critically colonized/Infected wounds
- Antimicrobial dressings
 - Silver dressings
 - Honey
 - Dakin's solution
 - Hydrofera Blue
 - Hypochlorous acid
 - Cadexomer iodine/PHMB
- Proper application and cost considerations

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

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
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
